I also took on the roll at my own branch as the Branch Cadet Liaison Officer to our Wing #895 Air Cadet Squadron in Mount Forest to keep me involved at a different level.











In the past I had attended many of the League & Sponsor Appreciation Days at Blackdown Camp in Camp Borden so I was quite familiar with what the camp had to offer for the cadets and had the opportunity to see them on parade many times. Greetings Comrades, I would like to start by thanking you all once again for your support this past May and having confidence in me to be one of your three Vice-Presidents, I am truly honoured. I also want to thank President Garry Pond for appointing me Provincial Poppy Chair. As well I also sit on the Provincial Property Committee, so it is very busy, and I am loving it! I honestly believe the work we do is so important and equally rewarding.

Since May I have had the opportunity to make one official visit, to District D and enjoyed their meetings as well as their hospitality. I was also lucky enough to spend a half day at my own convention in District A and it was a great pleasure to see my comrades from the A-Team even though it was all too short. Also, I attended Warriors Day in Toronto along with the many meetings as required by my position and committees.



The duties and responsibilities of the Provincial Poppy Chair far exceed what some may think is a short window of activity prior to and following the Poppy campaign, it is most definitely a yearlong effort. To date we have processed over 1100 Special Use Forms, this takes considerable time to review and approve, and I am happy to announce the approval rate is just over 85% on the first submission. Those that don't get approved on the first attempt usually get approved on the second or third submission bringing the average up to approximately 95%. The reason for denials is usually trying to donate Poppy Trust Funds to organizations or projects that are not allowed within the Poppy Manual. Great job by all branches raising funds and getting them distributed to our Veterans and their dependents as well as the community or health care facilities and projects that are permitted. At the writing of this report I do not have Poppy Campaign dollar figures, but from initial reports I would have to say most branches reported another successful campaign, thanks to the generosity of the public.

This year something that has me very concerned was the unauthorized reproduction of our Poppy image. Whether at a home shop, commercial endeavor or even large international companies, our protected Poppy image is being reproduced without permission and the monies are not going to Royal Canadian Legion Poppy Trust Funds. We

must all take a stand and help to report and stop this practice. Do not support these companies and report them, please. Any reproduction of the Poppy image must be approved by Dominion Command in advance, no exceptions. These companies are even so bold as to reproduce our Legion crest and market it on golf, dart shirts and other products. Again, do not support these companies.

This Remembrance Day was a cold and snowy affair in London, I had the honour to lay the first Legion wreath of the ceremony escorted by Zone A6 Commander Randy Warden. Later in the day, we held another



ceremony at Parkwood Institute for our Veteran residents in the warmth and comfort of the main auditorium; it was and always is a special ceremony.





Living in London and having Parkwood Institute literally in my back yard (I can walk there in 15 minutes) I have had several meetings with the staff to find out how we can improve our attention and care for our Veterans who reside within, provide more comfort, especially in the area of visitations as well as participating in the many programs they provide. One of the special moments every year is our Christmas morning visit. Every year since 1945 Legionnaires and friends have visited the Veteran residents of Parkwood to make sure every single one receives a Christmas gift chosen by them, some goodies, and some joy. Cadet Corps, Navy League, 31 Service Battalion, Santa Claus of course and Legionnaires from all over SW Ontario attend, many of us have made this a family tradition bringing our families with us before we go back home to celebrate the day.




Ron Goebel, Chairman Ontario Command, Chairman of our Ontario **Command Military Service Recognition Book program**

This problem hopefully will be rectified for next year as we plan on sending out our distribution listing to our District Commanders prior to sending the list on to our publisher for verification of all addresses through their Zone Commanders.


We also still continue to receive emails and telephone calls into our Provincial Headquarters regarding the authenticity of the sales efforts of our publisher, Fenety Marketing. In most cases, the problem stems from Branches either not being aware of our program, or the Branch not informing their members, staff and Executive members about our program and the sales calls that are made by our publisher.

Despite the problems we have encountered, our Remembrance MSRB program has been a huge success. To date, we have published a total of 4323 submissions in the first six volumes of our

books. And as of the writing of this report, we have 376 submissions for publication in Volume #7. There is a need though to continually promote our program within our Branches and for them to recognize Veterans within their communities through submissions for publication in our books of Remembrance. Please remember that submissions are published in our books on a first come, first served basis. So, the sooner a Branch sends their submissions to our Coordinators, the sooner they will be published.

Greetings comrades,

A reminder to branches when anticipating **ANY** property related expense in excess of \$10,000, or a contract, such as a lease, to first review pages 92 to 96 of the Ontario Command Officers' Manual 2012.

If you have questions, speak to your Zone Commander, who in turn, would take their questions to the District Commander. If the District Commander has questions, they are to contact the Provincial Committee Chairman. Branch members should use their Branch President as first resource. This process, as the Chain of Command, is the same for all committees. Your co-operation in following it would be appreciated.

Some people question what exactly is property? Briefly, property includes but is not limited to a Legion building and the ground it sits on. Changes of any kind,



permanent or temporary, in or about, inside or outside the building, on grounds adjacent or offsite, anything on any property belonging to the branch, that will cost in excess of \$10,000, must have the approval of the Provincial Property Committee **BEFORE** a letter of intent, a memorandum of understanding, a contract of one form or another is signed!

Our Committee is fortunate to have on our team, Comrades Dave Gordon, with his years of experience as Executive Director and Dave MacDonald, our consultant from Charlottetown, both with their excellent memories, to advise and guide.

The Provincial Property Committee has met with several developers over the past few years, some more credible than others. If branches are approached by property developers, presenting visions of grandeur, you might want to know if Ontario Command has had exposure to the developer, prior to discussions or negotiations of any sort.

Branches are autonomous, should the membership choose Joe Blow to shingle a wind damaged roof, to install new HVAC systems, or replace their floors, as long as, procedure has been followed, though we might warn or caution, we won't prevent moving forward.

Another reminder, insurance brokers each Spring and Fall remind us to have the branch roof checked for signs of wear and tear. If it looks bad to you, from the ground, it's worse up close! Please have a professional inspect! A quick thaw or good rain can do extensive and costly interior damage. Keep an eye on the ceiling. It can't be stressed enough Insurance is NOT a maintenance contract.



Comrades,

Well this is our second newsletter of this term so I will jump right into what our committee has been doing. First item of business for this term was to create a Welcome Letter for new Directors of the CF committee to help them define their duties and responsibilities. The letter includes everything from where to find information to how and why we meet, when we meet and what meetings they are expected to attend. The letter also explains the importance of this committee and how to get brochures and more information. It explains how important our Committee feels about transparency and confidentially. New Directors are asked to contact me or the Committee Secretary Aida Kostuck with any questions.

As you may know, there has been an issue regarding limitations on the use of poppy funds as they relate to a Hospice. The Charitable Foundation receives some applications from hospices every year. While some hospitals have their own "hospice" facilities or palliative care, many hospices are independent non-profit care facilities. The Foundation has always been treating these hospices as regular hospitals and awarding them funds for medical equipment. For the fiscal year



2018-2019, the total donations received were \$874,874.36. 66% of the donations for the Charitable Foundation and Bursary came from the Branch Poppy Funds, 23% came from the LA's and 11% came from corporations and individuals. With this information you can see that 34% of donations come from other than poppy funds, so donations from CF to hospices are well within the "other" funds and therefore in compliance with the poppy manual so please donate. An important reminder that when branches make the cheque presentations on behalf of the Charitable Foundation please ensure that you always include the Ladies' Auxiliary and be sure to mention that the donations go to help Veterans and the community at large.

The Legion is supporting so many more areas where branches and Ladies' Auxiliaries can donate and there is only so much money to go around so we understand decisions can be hard. CF only asks that you think of the help CF can be to the community and donate when you can. The donations below are all under the CF umbrella but are kept separate and apart within the Foundation. For the 2018-2019 fiscal year, the Veterans Comfort Fund received total donations of \$120,223.00 and interest of \$16,867.69 and the Joe Sweeney Fund (a.k.a. Leave the Streets Behind / Homeless Veterans Program) received total donations of \$48,274.30 plus interest of \$5,005.00. Ontario Command is also receiving donations from the LA and Branches for the "Operation Service Dogs for Veterans" program which is now a partnership with Wounded Warriors Canada (WWC) which totalled \$10,353.69. I mention all these programs to you as under our CF umbrella, registered receipts can be issued for donations received from the public or corporations to any of these programs. I am so very excited to be a part of this exceptional program. It is one more reason why the Royal Canadian Legion is such a remarkable organization and community benefactor.

Special thanks to the Ladies' Auxiliaries not only for their donations but for their leadership at committee level and being great partners. As always thanks to the branches, zones and districts for their donations. Without all of you there would be no Charitable Foundation. Thanks to all our staff at Provincial Headquarters.

Your Honours and Awards Committee has been quite busy over the past months that commenced in May 2019. As of writing this report in early December the committee has processed a total of 79 applications.


Life Membership – 61 applications with 40 being approved.



Operation: Leave the Streets Behind

The Homeless Veterans program continues to grow and as of November 30, 2019, we have assisted 820 Homeless Veterans in 161 towns and cities, and I note of those assisted 87 were female Veterans. With the generous donations from our Branches, Ladies' Auxiliary and outside donors we have disbursed over \$ 2.4 million dollars. Your donations have allowed for the purchase of Apartment Kits, provided first and last month's rent, Dental work, furniture and gift cards for food, to name only a few items.



Affordable Housing is in demand throughout the province and this is an item we need to be conscious of as we seek accommodation for our Homeless Veterans. Rents are high in all areas thus the need to put forward the Homeless program to the public.

I am also the OC rep for Sunnybrook Hospital and recently attended the Residents Council meeting November 18. The President of the Council reported that 35 Veterans assisted in the Poppy Campaign manning locations throughout Sunnybrook doing 1.5 hour shifts. The youngest was 78 years of age and the oldest 102, years of age and they hoped to raise over \$ 10,000.

Erl Kish Provincial Vice-Chairman, Veteran Services Seniors Homeless Veterans Committee

Comrades all.

As I have reported to the VSSHVC, all information received in relation to available seniors' programs and benefits has been distributed either by committee or all branch email. This allows the branches to decide which path to follow to fulfill the requirement in their particular area. Our focus should be on ensuring all seniors are receiving the care they so rightly deserve in their declining years, so we should direct our focus on improving the Long Term Care system within our Province which has a direct impact on the welfare of our veterans waiting in the wings for beds. This suggestion was accepted.



We are all aware that the current system does not include priority for our newer veterans serving after July 27th, 1953 or those with "Canada Service Only" during war time. We have attempted to rectify this problem through the resolution process, started with our convention in May. This resolution preceded a series of letters to the Minister of Health, the premier of Ontario and Veteran Affairs Canada, all of whom to some degree acknowledged receiving our concerns.

VAC acknowledgment resulted in a meeting at command office with two ADMs and a Director General. The meeting was cordial and informative, they listened attentively to our presentation, but my feeling is little will happen. When the term PAB was used during my presentation the ADM admitted that it was not a familiar term with him and that contract beds was his terminology. This was easily understood as the ADM had only been in the job five years, so the original term PAB would be unfamiliar. To date this subject meeting has not produced results as even the follow up by me to the the ADM s assistant has not received acknowledgment.

We are now concentrating on the Provincial Ministers who hold varying degrees of responsibilities for the health of our veterans and all seniors with letters being sent October 18th to the following Ministers, detailing our concerns, requesting action and a meeting. These letters were copied to the VSSHV committee.

Hon. Dr Merrilee Fullerton MPP Minister for Long Term Care and

Hon. Raymond Cho MPP. Minister for Seniors






